


Background

- Increasing rates of maternal mortality
 - U.S. maternal mortality rate **doubled** over the past two decades.
 - NYS was ranked 30th in the nation for maternal mortality in 2016
- Disproportionate impact among black women
 - Black women are over three times more likely to die than white women





Clear Ask
